column from 1935 to 1962 which she called My Day. For 27 years she penned her thoughts consistently six days a week, reaching far beyond what women typically

Looking forward to the coming months and charting this AAUW of Arizona path together, testing just how hot the water and how strong the tea bag.


AAUW Initiates New Fundraising Policy



A critical document, effective July 1, 2014, is now on the AAUW website: *AAUW Fundraising Policy 501*. AAUW and all its branches derive their tax status from the IRS and these new guidelines cover all that the IRS and AAUW require of the branches to maintain their 501(c)(4) tax status.

The policy includes IRS regulations that affect our fundraising, donor intent, donations to the branch, local scholarships and monetary awards, etc. The policy also covers AAUW's guidelines for contributions to other organizations, collaboration with other organizations, and the reasons why we should consider financial support of AAUW Funds our priority.

Influencing Public Policy Making the Difference by Jane Adrien

AAUW of Arizona members impacted public policy in Arizona during the 2013 Fiscal Year. Arizona AAUW members and supporters sent **3,757 messages** to Congress and the President through the <u>TWO MINUTE ACTIVIST</u>.

At the National level these contacts supported the passage of the bipartisan Violence Against Women Act and influenced the Obama administration to ensure that over the counter emergency contraception remained available to women. AAUW successfully lobbied the U.S. Department of Education's Civil Rights Data Collection survey to ask schools whether they have a Title IX coordinator and how many students were bullied because of sexual orientation.

AAUW successfully lobbied during the January 2013 fiscal cliff deal to return to the Clinton-era tax rates for high income earners while continuing the current rates for middle-class individuals. AAUW member responses to national calls to action influenced the extension for the American Opportunity Tax Credit, the protection of Social Security, and the extension of federal unemployment insurance.

At the State level, there are currently 2,900 Action Network subscribers **as** this issue of the SUN goes to press. Of these, 943 members are part of the Arizona action network.

AAUW of Arizona, with the assistance of the National Government Affairs staff, conducted two action alerts at the state level. The first asked Governor Brewer to veto HB 1062 – Relating to Free Exercise of Religion - which permitted an individual to cite religious beliefs as a defense against a potential law suit in the face of claims that the refusal of service is based on discrimination. 267 members of the action network contacted Governor Brewer's office to ask for veto, which she did. Although AAUW of

Arizona cannot claim to have influenced Governor Brewer's decision exclusively, still members can take credit for adding voices to silence HB 1062.

AAUW of Arizona's second action alert asked members and supporters to oppose HB 2284, misleadingly titled – Women's Health Protection Act - that singled out reproductive healthcare providers for surprise inspections that potentially threatened women's medical privacy and the closure of clinics. 194 members and supporters sent messages and asked Governor Brewer to veto the bill. In this case, the action alert was unsuccessful as Governor Brewer signed HB 2284 into law.

The Rocky Mountain Regional Conference, held on June 6-8, 2014, in Reno NV and attended by eleven AAUW Arizona members.

Specific ideas for the program choices and website design were covered.

An election year presents branches with a number of special opportunities and certain responsibilities. **Yelle** emphasized that it is important that AAUW members be reminded of the specifics. *AAUW is a nonprofit 501c3* organization, and many of the state-level organizations and branches are 501c4. In order to protect this tax status, there are rules we MUST follow.

Guipati presented No *More Shooting in the* Dark, a detailed strategy for identifying and targeting new members. She also outlined a coordinated approach to marketing our branches by telling people who we are, what we do, why we should care, and what we want them to do. She emphasized that a key element of marketing involves multiple board positions membership, program,

Maatz 'entertained' us with a recap of AAUW's efforts on Capitol Hill and the White House on ERA, pay equity, campus sexual assault, and Violence Against Women Act. She reconfirmed AAUW's efforts on all fronts when Congress reconvenes after the holiday. She thanked all members for responding

to AAUW Action Alerts and appealed for a renewed push to get more members to sign up as <u>Two Minute Activist</u> and subscribe to the <u>AAUW</u> <u>Washington Update</u>

Opportunity to explore a new city and a chance for members from similar geographic states to share solutions to similar challenges.

We discovered how other Rocky Mountain states have met specific challenges created by large, often mountainous, distances between branches. Each state presented a different project or emphasis. **Jane Adrian**, AAUW-AZ President, cleverly led participants 'Down the Rabbit Hole' like a modern day Alice to explore the trials and frustrations of dealing with the Arizona Legislature and efforts to 'reshuffle this deck of cards'. Participants were provided a personalized tour of the historical parts of Reno plus frequent opportunities to socialize with members from Nevada, Idaho, Utah, Colorado, and New Mexico.

President Ho stressed the goals of AAUW as we "Move Forward in 2015". Tucson: Imagine IT (STEM) Camp

Many thanks go out to NWV-AAUW and AAUW-Tucson for sending girls to camp for a week this summer. A total of 11 middle school girls received a full scholarship to attend Imagine IT resident camp held at the University of Arizona. The camp's theme was search and rescue and focused on how information technology, engineering and robotics can make a difference during natural disasters. The girls worked in groups to build and program robots, incorporating motors, LEDs, and distance and motion sensors. On Friday, groups presented their robot, demonstrated its capabilities, and described their computer program to a panel of women scientists and engineers from the community.

The Imagine IT camp was a partnership program between the Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona and the U of A's College of Engineering. Both organizations worked in collaboration to provide an engaging and hands-on engineering experience for the girls. The University partnered with Girl Scouts of Southern Arizona to offer the the STEM-oriented experience in hope of encouraging girls' interest in the STEM disciplines.

Twenty-five girls participated in cooperative activities which explored natural disasters like fires and earthquakes. Working cooperatively, teams built a robot designed to assist in a specific search and rescue operation to be used during a natural disaster.

On Thursday, September 18, at the Northwest Valley Branch general meeting, several of the girls sponsored by the branch, along with their principal, Dr. Shelley Isai, will discuss their camp experience and show a short video of them at work on their robots.

STEM has been an ongoing Northwest Valley Branch project. The branch maintains close ties with Canyon Ridge School which features an integrated STEM curriculum. We are proud of the work we are doing to bring awareness of the need for more women in the STEM fields.

As incoming President of our Branch, I have some big shoes to fill. Fortunately, we have an active and committed group of members who are willing to put their time and effort into supporting our Branch, and I look forward to working with them all.

As I reviewed what our Branch has accomplished in the last year, I can't help but be impressed. Our membership increased from 67 in September to 80 in April, and we held a new Members Coffee in February. (The half scholarship was granted to a woman who had only one semester remaining before graduation.)

Our members support a variety of Interest Groups. In addition to a new Scrabble Group, members continue to attend the Book Discussion Group (which is so large it must meet at two locations), Bridge Group, Drama Group, Foreign Screen and Cuisine Group, and Mah Jongg Group. We have a Website - and a Webmaster who is dedicated — which attracts attention and helps to bring us new members and provides us with branch information.

We continue to support Running and Winning with the League of Women Voters of Greater

Tucson and with the participation of Political Science graduate students from the University of Arizona. This workshop is intended to acquaint high school girls with the possibilities of running for political office and includes presentations by women who hold office in Pima County and the Tucson area. Running and Winning will be held this year on September 11 at Flowing Wells High School in Tucson. Our members also supported AAUW-AZ activities, attending the Fall Forum, Lobby Day,and the Conference on the Status of Women.

I look forward to the coming year. With such a dedicated group of women, we can't miss!
