And I watched as small sums of supportive monies fledged into substantial project resources as branches explored and innovated in their local regions. Not long ago we were thinking in terms of what AAUW can do--we still are, of course, but now you are as likely to consider what AAUW can do in cooperation with other groups which represent our shared values.

We have expanded – in our ideas, in our associations, in our projects, and in our stature. Interestingly, in this same period of time, as Sara Wolters

noted, we have become closer as a group of people. Maybe it is the shared energy, the satisfaction of successes or the plain fact that we are – in my view — the finest women on the planet. Educated women willing to work hard to help other women and girls become successful.

Of course, there is much more we can do. I am excited about the "Flagstaff" model of connecting with women's groups already on college campuses; we need to find more ways to connect with young women so that we can help them with more than scholarships, and we need to create new branches. Should not EVERY campus have an AAUW group interested in it?

That would give "town and gown" new meaning.

But I digress...let me end by telling you that it has been a decided privilege to serve this state organization for the last two years. You marvelous ladies have taken me on a wonderful ride, and I appreciate you all.

AAUW National Executive Director Linda Hallman Addresses Phoenix Branch

When Ms. Hallman spoke to the Phoenix Branch on Feb. 18th, she explained that she likes to think of AAUW as PEARL:

Protects Women and Girls Educates * Advocates * Researches * Leads.

She said that President Obama is open to "women's issues" as evidenced by his signing the Lily Ledbetter Act on his first day in office and welcoming AAUW Vice President Lisa Maatz and herself to his office.

Ms. Hallman said that we still need a Paycheck Fairness Act and that Forbes Magazine had an op-ed piece in its favor. There are House and Senate versions of the Act that need to be reconciled and passed.

She also reported that:

AAUW gives \$4 million per year in Fellowships and Grants to 250 awardees.

Start Smart is a program to teach negotiation skills to women when applying for their first job and that their starting salary determines how their income will progress over the years.

AAUW is part of the Clinton Global Initiative that invites young, promising people to come to its seminar and make a commitment in their area of expertise to develop something new.

AAUW has 180,000 members and is part of the United Nations.

Ms. Hallman encouraged members to participate in the "Give a Grad a Gift" program. A donation of \$49 pays for a one year membership for a graduate.

Marybeth Carlile, longtime member of the Tucson Branch, passed away at her home in Sedona on March 18. In 1963, when Marybeth moved to Tucson with her husband and family, she immediately



became an active member of AAUW. She served as Tucson Branch president from 1973 to 1975 and as president of the Arizona Division from 1979 to 1980. She was Rocky Mountain Regional Coordinator for Families and Work in 1981-1982 and was a member of the Program Development Committee at the Association level in 1987-1988.

Marybeth was an active member of an AAUW study group that concentrated on water issues in southern Arizona. In 1978, Governor Bruce Babbitt appointed her to the Arizona Water Commission, and Governor Rose Mofford appointed her to the Commission on the Arizona Environment. In 1982, Marybeth became executive director of Southern Arizona Water Resources Association (SAWRA) where she established a xeriscape program, still in use today. She was elected to represent Pima County on the Central Arizona Project Board of Directors where she served from 1990 until 2002. She credited her service to Arizona to "many years of study... and good background work in AAUW."

Those of us who knew Marybeth admired her intelligence, her wisdom, her thoughtfulness, her wonderful sense of humor, her honesty, and her warmth. She was a devoted wife and mother and a faithful friend. She will be greatly missed.

Education in Arizona

Confused about what is really happening in K-12 education in Arizona? With the flurry of news stories and all the partisan rhetoric it is frequently difficult to cut through to the facts. And many of us who moved from other states tend to assume that the terminology used for public school education is pretty much the same from state to state.

In an attempt to better understand the Arizona K-12 education scene, my husband an I proceeded to develop a simple matrix examining terms, programs and policies used in Arizona education. The study resulted in a 21- page document with references published as a white paper by the League of Women Voters of NW Maricopa County. The intention was to facilitate common baseline understanding from which to discuss the education of all of Arizona's youth.

Using power point slides and drawing from the white paper, John and I have developed a presentation to generate group discussion and a more in-depth understanding of K-12 education issues in Arizona. We would like to make this presentation to AAUW branches or AAUW-sponsored meetings. The program requires a minimum of 1.5 to two hours for presentation and group discussion.

Programs and policies are designed to address needs and to identify intended outcomes. However, all policies and programs also result in unintended consequences -- both positive and negative. The trick is to maximize the intended outcomes and to minimize negative consequences. The intention of the white paper is not to say one program is right and another program is wrong but rather to stimulate community discussion of various approaches to educating all of our young people.

John and I are retired educators. John is a former dean and professor emeritus at Montana State University, and had a 47 year career in education --as a teacher, professor, researcher and administrator. His experience included work as Senior Associate with the Education Commission of the States (State Governors and Chief State School Officers), on the Board of the NW Educational Laboratory, Professor of Education and Director of the Center for Cooperative Research with Schools at The Pennsylvania State University, and Pennsylvania State Director of the Appalachian Educational Laboratory.

I was a faculty member at Montana State University and Pennsylvania State University and also development officer at Montana State. I started my professional career with the University of Wyoming Extension Service prior to a year-long government study in Washington, D.C. Much of my professional career has been focused on "at-risk youth" issues.

AAUW Tucson Branch ~ A Look Back at 2013-14

AAUW Tucson Branch held its Annual Meeting on April 12, 2014 and this gave me pause to reflect on the state of the branch for the year behind us and the year ahead. I was fortunate to attend the National Convention in June 2013 and the theme of *Leading Across Generations* has been my guide as Co-President Nieves Miljure and I embarked on our first year as branch leaders.

Some highlights: A successful leadership retreat was held in August 2013; in October the co-presidents hosted a luncheon for past presidents of the branch and nine past presidents reconnected with each other, on a personal level and as active members (still!) of our branch; and in December a membership survey was conducted along with a similar survey of college students and young professionals. The two results were compared and a strategic planning committee was formed to address existing membership and projected membership issues as we move ahead. Our bylaws were updated and our policies were aligned with the bylaws. We held successful fundraisers for AAUW Funds in February and for our Virginia Palmer Scholarship at Pima Community College in March. The Louise Hoppy scholarship for Native Americans was again funded and awarded. Branch membership increased by about 6 since the official February 1st count and we are now nearing the 100 mark once again.

The branch is in the process of implementing changes which can, at times, be a challenge for everyone. Our website has been updated and has become our main source of information with links to AAUW and events.

As we look ahead to 2014-15, we will work towards increasing our membership by

redesigning branch events and meetings to meet the needs not only of our current membership but also of new members and changing demographics. As the strategic plan for the branch is developed and finalized, we will have specific goals to meet in areas such as membership involvement in the branch as well as community outreach. We look forward to increasing our fundraising target not only in AAUW funding but also in support of our local scholarships for women re-entering college and university.

Along with changes, there are traditions to be respected. Once again in May, we will honor our branch *Women of Distinction*, a practice since 1965. Our history with AAUW dates to 1930 because we began as the Collegiate Club in 1909. In the near future, we will celebrate the publication of a book ~ our very own historical record.

Our journey continues.

Pay Equity: Three Perspectives

"It was excellent, I learned a lot of information I didn't know before"; "I took notes for my daughter and grand-children"; "Sharon's story was compelling and heartfelt"; "Excellent – felt a call to action"; and "I have a better understanding of EEOC (Equal Employment Opportunity Commission)" were just a few of the comments received after the April 7th *Pay Equity: Three Perspectives* program held at Mustang Library.

This program, in lieu of the Scottsdale branch's Community Action/Public Policy monthly meeting, featured the following:

<u>Sharon Hettick</u> - a successful claimant and incoming chair of AAUW-Arizona Public Policy who described her poignant journey about filing discrimination charges. Additionally, she discussed several ideas pertaining to the slate of issues for AAUW AZ Public Policy;

<u>Karen Stafford</u> - MHRM, SPHR, an experienced HR professional who provided insight into the training now offered to HR staff to alleviate gender pay discrimination;

<u>Patricia Miner</u> - EEOC Charge Receipt Supervisor, who explained how investigators decide if cases go forward and the actual process involved as well as the role of the EEOC as a federal law enforcement agency which cannot advocate nor provide legal advice;

<u>Cherrie Martin</u> - EEOC investigator, who explained that you don't need an actual person to file a charge and indicated that those in the community are often the best resources. She asked if anyone has "more than a hunch" and can articulate "here's what is happening" in terms of discrimination to contact the EEOC for follow up.

AAUW is an organization whose mission is to empower women through research, education, advocacy and philanthropy and has pay equity as one of its key issues. The successful event was collaborative and included audience participation from AAUW and community members as well as government employees.

Several new interest groups were produced this year: A to Z, Movie and a Meal, and Journaling. As they left, he appeared more shocked than she as to how long this problem has been going on with no justice for those who have been attacked. At the end of the film, we announced that AAUW, through our Legal Advocacy Program, is appealing the case.

The board of directors voted to try something new beginning in May, called "Gatherings with a Theme" to be held during the summer break. The monthly theme will take the place of a formal general meeting and will allow our membership and non-AAUW members to hear speakers on AAUW topics of interest; i.e., educational methods for the future, the status of women in AZ, and women's health issues.

The branch is pleased to announce that the next *Author's Luncheon* will be held on April 4, 2015. We encourage AAUW-AZ members to save the date and plan to attend another terrific event with us.


students from the other Arizona universities. NAU alumna Sara Presler was the keynote speaker for the day's event.

AAUW's generous grant made it possible for 60 girls to explore careers in science, technology, engineering and math during hands-on workshops led by professional women in those fields. While the girls were conducting experiments in astronomy, chemistry, medicine, physics and zoology, their parents were learning how to guide their daughters in selecting the right high school courses, as well as details on financing a college education.

Sponsors of the event were AAUW-Arizona, AAUW-Green Valley, Freeport McMoRanCopper and Gold Sierrita Operations, and the University of Arizona's Women In Science and Engineering (WISE).

Everyone had a great time, including the volunteers who organized and participated in the conference.
