intelligent and inspiring speakers. For those of you unable to attend, I will share with you some of my very brief take-aways from each speaker.

Deborah J. Vagins, Senior VP, Public Policy and Research, AAUW: Sometimes pay equity is affected by the fact that men ask for a raise/higher pay four times as often as women, one of the reasons for AAUW's focus on gender equity and the creation of their programs Work Smart and Start Smart. Women tend to drop out of AAUW when they get into their careers and then return later to AAUW when they retire. To boost continuity in membership, there will be support for online branches to upgrade and expand their online training programs about salary negotiations, pay equity, and sexual discrimination in the work place.

Amber Gould, National Education Association State Director: She asked members to contact her directly via email at <u>amber.d.gould@gmail.com</u> with concerns/ideas regarding improving AZ education. Amber encouraged us to participate in the RTS (right to speak) process and is willing to set-up any branch member for the program if you send your name, email address, and a request to participate to her. **Linda Alepin,** Founding Director, You as a Global Leader: As you know, Linda is currently doing an excellent job of orchestrating the AAUW AZ strategic planning process. February Legislature Day a Success By Harriet Young

A full house of AAUW-AZ members crowded the Historic Supreme Court Chambers of the Arizona Capitol Building for our annual Legislature Day.

This year was particularly memorable since we had been meeting since December to develop our legislative agenda: full funding for public education, pass the ERA, end gender harassment, full access to healthcare for women, and equal pay for equal work.

We had sent post cards, made phone calls, and organized email chains to urge our legislators to enact our agenda. Alas, most of our legislators followed a leadership that is directly opposed to these goals.

During our morning at the Capitol, House Whip Athena Salman, visited us and celebrated the election of a record number of women to the legislature. She urged us to stay engaged for 2020. She brought greetings from House Majority Leader Charlene Fernandez and noted that we had five women leaders in the two houses of the legislature, a record.

At the next session of Legislature Day held in the Historic Senate Chambers, we met two experienced lobbyists, Joachin Rios of State Innovation Exchange (SIX) and Rivko Knox of the League of Women Voters. Both gave us excellent ideas for improving our future impact on the Arizona Legislature.

Following our program, we dispersed to visit our individual legislators, share a table at lunch, and then attend the opening of the sessions in both houses where we were introduced by one of the members. Sen. Jamescita Peshlakai gave a particularly warm introduction to our delegation in the Senate.

It is both educational and motivating to see our elected officials in our public institutions and to remind them of the voters they represent.



AAUW Members Invited to Flagstaff Branch Annual Public Policy Luncheon By Susan Peters

The Flagstaff branch is excited to announce an outstanding speaker for its 2019 Fall Public Policy Luncheon on October 12. Ms. Mitra Shahri, a lawyer from Portland, Oregon, who specializes in employment discrimination and sexual harassment cases, will present *Female Power: From Status Quo to MeToo! It's never too late to make things right!* In the afternoon, Mitra will lead a workshop to discuss how to respond to harassment and bullying behavior.

Mitra grew up in Iran, moved to the US, and succeeded in medical malpractice law in Los Angeles. But after she suffered sexual harassment and discrimination herself, she switched to employment law and was active in harassment suits involving Hollywood celebrities and movie studios. In 2002 she moved to Portland and established a successful Employment Law Firm.

Mitra is a member of the National Speakers Association and occasionally does stand-up comedy. She has twice been voted the *Funniest Lawyer in Oregon*. The ABA recently listed Mitra as "one of the most fascinating lawyers of 2018". We hope members from all AZ AAUW Branches will plan to attend and invite interested friends to do so as well. The ACTION in Community Action Is Up to Each Branch

Three branches have consistently used AAUW State Community Action funds in their efforts to help uplift the young women in their communities. Branches are encouraged to explore ways in which they can support young women in

their communities. The programs need not be elaborate to be effective.

Kudos to Tucson and Northwest Tucson for their partnership with the League of Women Voters to develop the excellent program *Running and Winning*. Over the years, hundreds of students have been introduced to women who have been elected to state and local positions. The goal of the day-long workshop is to encourage young women to become engaged in civic affairs.

Prescott also continues its mentoring efforts in partnership with Yavapai College. Encouraging students from the rural school systems in Yavapai County to continue their education beyond high school has been their primary goal. Graduation rates and college admission numbers have increased dramatically since the inception of the programs.

The opportunity to apply occurs only once a year, on March 15. Applications for 2021 must be submitted to the new Community Action Chair, Mary Jo Blum of the Northwest Valley branch, by that date in 2020. All necessary instructions and forms are available on the state website.

New AZ Strategic Plan Process Passes Second Milestone By Linda Alepin

The Arizona State AAUW strategic planning process is in full swing. At the recent Spring Forum, the second step of the process *Dream* was completed.

The *Dream* phase was composed of three sessions, two in person and one done virtually.

One format used was a visioning session looking backward from 2024. It used Appreciative Inquiry questions:

- We made a real difference in women's lives by...?
- What attracted a diverse set of members?
- What contributed most to sustaining a feeling of belonging for current members?
- The most significant factor that allowed AAUW to create something exceptional was...?
- The bold decisions that allowed for forward action were...?

There were many outstanding answers to these questions. Overwhelmingly, they projected that AAUW will orient itself to attract younger people including through our online presence and by launching mentoring approaches. We will expand our programs to meet more community needs, building our reputation as an organization of **action**. We will continue to value the ideas and volunteer contributions of our members. We will launch new partnerships and collaborative efforts.

A second, highly interactive format was used at the Spring Conference. This time, in-person participants were asked to think about their favorite AAUW activity and why they cared about it. People were then divided into groups around each activity and brainstormed how their "cares" could help attract new members.

Some highlights of the discussions: Book clubs, an organic way to pull in members; Public policy, education on issues leads to action; Communication, become recognized as the "credible source of research and information impacting women, girls, and families"; Scholarships, outreach to students by being at retail stores where they shop.

The strategy committee plans a two-day meeting in July when they will take all the information generated

from *Discover* and *Dream* and complete the two final phases, *Design* and *Deliver*.

Using Social Media to Attract Young Professionals By Linda Alepin

A pilot program to attract young professionals to AAUW membership was conducted from December to April by the Tucson AAUW branch. With the assistance of three graduate student volunteers, social media campaigns were conducted on FaceBook and Instagram. While the initial idea had been to highlight state and national policy issues on the Facebook and Instagram sites, the publication of a New York Times article in January started a focus on the "she-roes" of 2018. The first post was as follows: "We have seen some amazingly strong women speaking truth to power and fighting for change, often against powerful odds. In our upcoming series, we will be featuring six feminist sheroes of the year 2018." The women included Michelle Obama and Kirsten Sinema among others.

The idea then morphed into featuring women from the University of Arizona on the AAUW Tucson Bulletin social media pages. The student volunteers recruited their favorite professors to be profiled in future posts. We ended the series for this year with a post about another New York Times article, *What Happens When Women Stop Leading Like Men*, by Tina Brown. The campaign has a following of 206 followers, and each post is getting upwards of 50+ likes. That is only a start for a social media campaign.

Our next campaign starting in August (with the start of school) will be about the burnout generation, the millennials. This series will lead to yet another one about the gender wage gap to promote our Start Smart sessions.

East Mesa Branch Granted Nearly \$250,000 in Scholarships

The AAUW East Mesa branch distributed \$230,000 in scholarship money this year, both for local scholars (\$104,000) and a nationally named Fellowship (\$120,000), along with a grant to Mesa Public Schools for the STEM Odyssey Space Integration Module (SIM) for \$6,000.

We think this is a big deal for our community!


For over thirty years, the hard-working, dedicated members of this branch have raised \$214,000 for 175 local scholars and a national Fellowship of \$120,000 through various fundraisers such as fashion shows, garage sales, direct donations, and an annual Scholarship Author's Luncheon.

In 2016 we received a windfall endowment from our founder and first branch president Dr. Violet H. Larney who left 44% of her estate when she passed away to the AAUW East Mesa branch. The earnings on those endowed funds are designated for a perpetual fund for scholarships, fellowships, and other AAUW charitable activities and are the reason we were able to make such great contributions this year. Our members have worked with diligence to provide scholars with financial aid. Violet's legacy has provided the "icing on the cake" for our scholars. In addition to raising funds and vetting the applications for those scholarships, each local recipient has an AAUW member serving as her mentor to provide advice and support throughout the duration of her award. Some of the recipients are just beginning their college experience while others receive support further along in their college experience.

AAUW leads the nation in advocacy for women, especially in the areas of pay equity, leadership, empowerment, education and training.

This past year, Flagstaff branch members have enjoyed several inspiring gatherings. Our Fall 2018 Public Policy Luncheon hosted presentations by AZ Secretary of State Katie Hobbs and Felicia French (then a candidate for AZ House) on *What Do Women Bring to Public Office*. Many local candidates, politicians, friends, and members attended.

We hosted author Nancy McLean who spoke on her recent book, *Democracy in Chains*, an eye-opening look about extremist efforts to suppress voting rights, take over college campuses, and subvert democracy. We met for a fun White Elephant Party at Christmas time. And in the fall and spring we held our Naked Lady events (from the imagination of President Ann Griffin), a well-received clothing exchange. The Naked Lady events encouraged folks to donate lightly used clothing and to buy something "new" as well. Leftovers were donated to our local clothing center for women in need.

Member Lisa Martinez is an accomplished painter and hosted our annual Sip and Paint evening. Participants expressed their inner Van Gogh spirit while partaking in some appropriate libations.

In January we instituted monthly meetings on hot topics. So far, we've had a panel discussion on **gun control** (including representatives from Moms Demand Action); **women in religion**, featuring two local Christian pastors; and a meeting at the synagogue on the recent rash of **hate crimes** against Jews as well as Muslims and others. These meetings will continue in the fall as we identify more topics that will educate and empower women in our community.
