East Mesa Ramps It Up for Education and STEM

In January, East Mesa will hear about the exciting STEM program in Mesa elementary schools, specifically the SIM (Space Integration Module). Funded by Boeing, their program brings 6th grade classrooms on a field trip to a site where they run a Mission Control, the Orion space capsule, and the International Space Station. Each student has an assigned role and anywhere from 4-6 tasks to complete. As each task is completed the Director "rewards" the crew with oxygen credits. The goal is not to run out of oxygen—because if that happens in space, you die. Students have practiced these tasks in the classroom, but once on site, they are totally on their own; it is collaborative, self-directed learning. While Boeing funds the program, there are still areas of need that our branch is looking to fill. Filling those needs may turn into a special project for us, our first.

On February 9, 2019, we have our annual Scholarship Fundraiser Luncheon. This year our guest is the Arizona author/speaker Jan Cleere from Oro Valley who will entertain us with stories of women who helped found and build Arizona. In 30 years our branch has raised \$194,000 in scholarship funds for 170 scholars, including one national Fellowship.
