- Human rights.



AAUW Reports

One Year After Graduating From College, Research Proves:

7 % wage difference between males and females

Despite accounting for factors such as college major, occupation, industry, sector, hours worked, workplace flexibility, experience, educational attainment, enrollment status, GPA, college selectivity, age, race/ethnicity, region, marital status, and motherhood.



High quality public education:

- is the foundation of a democratic society; and
- remains vital to economic prosperity and gender equality.



Citizens must have a strong system of public education which assures every student:

- Gender fairness;
- Equity; and
- Diversity.



Responsible funding is needed for all levels of learning, including:

- Early childhood education
- Programs for students with disabilities

Charter schools also take a bite.

Charters receive 90 % of the district (public) school fund rate per student, plus up to \$2K more per student through "equalization dollars" to compensate for charters' inability to collect operational and capital funds from voters through bonds and overrides. Both are funds which otherwise could be allocated to public education.



Scope of charter impact 2016-17:

- 1.1 million AZ students attended statefunded district and charter schools;
- Charters taught 179,669 (16 %);
- Per student funding totaled 27 % of state dollars for that purpose.

Narrow window freezes rate.

- Districts' student head count finalizes for year at 100th day;
- Per student funding set for rest of year – regardless of additional students enrolling thereafter;
- Districts must accept all students.



Playing Field Remains Uneven.



District Schools Cha

- · Public schools
- Must accept all students
- Must provide ELL and SPED services
- Audited every year
- Must publicly share all spending & financial info
- Must publicly report academic results
- Must provide lunch plan & transportation for all students
- Built when there is a demonstrated need
- School boards are elected by local voters; follow open meeting laws; local control

Charter Schools

- Public schools privately controlled by contractors using taxpayer funds
- Do not have to provide ELL or SPED services;
- Statistically serve fewer ELL and SPED students
- Narrow reporting requirements on spending; can make profits
- Reviewed by peer every 5 years and by Charter Board every 15 years
- Materials are privately owned and leased to school at taxpayer expense
- Do not have to provide food or transportation
- · Self-appointed and run boards

Private Schools

- Private schools (religious and non-religious) that are privately funded
- Receive public funds via ESA vouchers & STO tax credits
- Decide which students they will accept
- Do not have to provide ELL or SPED services
- Do not have to follow federal laws, (IDEA disability laws)
- Do not have to follow any reporting requirements (financial or academic)
- Do not have to provide food or transportation
- Self-appointed boards

Talking Points ERA: The Guarantee

Equal application of law and protection under the U.S. Constitution will be guaranteed with ratification of the ERA. No longer will rights previously earned be restrained or taken away by political whim.

Talking Points ERA: Boon to Economy

The Economist magazine estimated in 2018 that advancing women's equality would add \$2.1 trillion to \$4.3 trillion to the U.S. economy in the next decade.

The ERA is a financial goldmine.



Where AZ Stands Today

A resolution to ratify the ERA has been introduced in the AZ House, Senate, or both, multiple years since 1982.

Political maneuvering and grandstanding block the resolutions from being heard in committee and getting to the floor for a vote.
