

#### **Guest Speakers**



Hilda Ladner is the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Officer for Pima Community College. She works with units throughout the College to create a climate where all members of our community feel a sense of belonging. At Pima, Hilda leads efforts to assess campus climate for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion and administers the College's DEI Strategic Plan. Her career in higher education has always focused on expanding access and success for students most underserved in higher education. Hilda earned a Master of Education degree in Multicultural and Bilingual Education and a

Bachelor of Arts degree in Modern Languages from Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, Arizona, where she later served as director of the Multicultural Student Center.



Dr. Jill Williams is an Associate Research Professor in the Southwest Institute for Research on Women (SIROW) at the University of Arizona and serves as the Director of the Women in Science and Engineering (WISE) Program. As WISE Director, Dr. Williams oversees the development, implementation, and evaluation of strategic efforts to support the recruitment, retention, and success of female-identifying students in the sciences and engineering, as well as institutional research aimed at identifying and understanding inequities in STEM student outcomes. Dr.

Williams holds an MA in Women's Studies from the University of Cincinnati and a PhD in Geography from Clark University.

# AAUW Arizona Branch Special Projects



Do you have a special project that you would like the state AAUW to help with? AAUW AZ has accumulated funds over the past several years. Some of these funds are being made available to branches in the form of monies for mission-based programs. These monies are separate from the Community Action Grants. In the past, emphasis has been placed on in-person branch member involvement, but because of Covid-19 a branch might want to include some Zoom presentations.

Applications are due to the Branch Special Projects Chair, Gail Garrison, **no later than two weeks prior to each state board meeting**. They are then sent to all board members. Discussion and approval for timely applications occurs at board meetings which are held the third Wednesday of every other month at 4PM by Zoom. At this point in time, board meetings are scheduled for November, January, March, and May. Applications may be sent by email attachment. Plan to have a representative from your branch at the Zoom board meeting to answer questions.

Several branches have applied for and been awarded monies to help with a special project. Over the last 10 years, 10 of 14 branches have requested monies for their special projects, some more than once, and over \$21,000 has been awarded by AAUW AZ. A list of the branch projects with a short description of each is included on page 11-13 of this newsletter.

# Building a Relationship with an area College

Though Donna stays in our communication loop, once she learned about our interest in publicizing and promoting our local scholarship opportunities at CGCC, she provided the names of several contacts there.

Kimberley Kocak, Ashanti Netsanet, and Yvette Strickling, administrators at CGCC, were very helpful in guiding our scholarship committee to ensure our scholarship application was posted online for easy student access and the word was spread of our scholarship opportunities. As applications were received our Branch scholarship committee made up of Mary Humecke, Penny Rings, Brianna Willits, and Beth Zdeblick reviewed all applications and awarded scholarships to three very deserving women. Amy Chavez is pursuing Airframe and Powerplant certifications to be an Aviation Maintenance Technician. Rhiannon Lucero is pursuing Nursing with the goal of becoming a Midwife, specifically to women of color. Angela Munoz is pursuing Kinesiology to achieve her goal of becoming a Physical Therapist.

All three of these remarkable women have been invited to tell their stories at our January 2022 Branch meeting. Our intent, as schools open to public visitors and events start up again, is to expand our relationship with CGCC, staff a SE Valley Branch table at the "Women Rising" annual event in 2022, and continue to grow our support of deserving CGCC women students through our local scholarship program.

#### Student Debt Makes it Hard for New Graduates to Make Ends Meet

## AAUW's 2021 Deeper in Debt report finds:

- Women hold an average of \$31,276 in student debt, leaving them with a monthly loan payment of \$307 the year after graduation. Given that women graduating with a bachelor's degree expect to earn an average of \$35,338—only 81% of what men anticipate earning—meeting that loan obligation is challenging at best.
- One year after college, women spend an average of \$920 per month on housing, \$396 per month on a car loan and, for the 16% of women who are moms, \$520 on childcare, the report finds. Adding in that \$307 student loan payment makes it difficult—if not downright impossible—to make ends mee
