

With Katie Hobbs inauguration as Governor, Arizona is first U.S. state to have had five female governors

When Katie Hobbs was installed as Arizona's 24th governor Monday, her inauguration marked an important milestone for our state and for women. Arizona has now had five female governors, leading the nation with more female governors than any other state in the U.S. Many states have still never elected a female governor.



Governor Hobbs released the following statement following her swearing in: "Today marks a new chapter for Arizona. As we look forward to a brighter future, I pledge that the needs of Arizonans - not partisan politics - will always come first. I will work with Republicans, Democrats, and Independents to tackle our state's biggest challenges - fully funding our public schools, securing our state's water future, ensuring reproductive freedom, making Arizona more affordable, and so much more."

"I will never stop fighting for working families in our state. It is the greatest honor of my life to serve the state I love - and I'll never forget the faith that Arizonans have placed in me."

Women in Government continued.....

After two record-shattering elections for women in Congress, the past election represented an expansion for women governors. Nearly 25 percent of the nation's governors will be women in 2023, including in several states that have never before elected a woman to their top office, Though the Governor's position is one of the most important and prestigious elective offices, Governors' seats have been traditionally more difficult for women to win.

Women make up more than a quarter (28%) of all members of the 118th Congress – counting both those serving in the House of Representatives and the Senate, women account for 153 of the 540 members of Congress -- the highest percentage in U.S. history and a considerable increase from the 96 serving in Congress a decade ago.

The first woman elected to Congress occurred more than a century ago when Montana's <u>Jeannette Rankin</u>, was elected to the House in 1916, two years after Montana gave women the vote. However, women didn't begin serving in larger numbers until just the past few decades. Nearly two-thirds of the women ever elected to the House and nearly three-fourths of the women elected to the Senate were elected in 1992 or later.

<u>Kathleen Marie Hobbs</u> (born December 28, 1969) is an American politician and social worker serving as the 24th governor of Arizona since 2023. She previously served as the 21st secretary of state of Arizona from 2019 to 2023.

Jodi Liggett is Founder of the Arizona Center for Women's Advancement – ACWA. Prior to this, she served as Governor Jane Dee Hull's policy advisor for Human services, Director and CEO of the AZ Foundation for Women (AFW), Mayor Greg Stanton's senior policy advisor, and Executive Director of Planned Parenthood Advocates. Most recently, Jodi was Phoenix Mayor Kate Gallego's deputy chief of staff before founding the ACWA.





<u>David Lujan</u> is an American politician who served in the Arizona legislature from 2005 until 2013. He was first elected to the Arizona House of Representatives in 2004 representing most of the central Phoenix area. He is currently the President and CEO of Children's Action Alliance.


<u>Nicky Indicavitch</u> is a mother of five public school children. She lives in Prescott Valley and has been organizing parents, teachers and community members to support public education in Arizona for the past 6 years. She currently serves as the Statewide Outreach Director for Save Our Schools Arizona.







- ◆Under universal vouchers, the ESA voucher program has **expanded from 11,000 to 45,000** users <u>a 400% increase</u>.
- ◆The JLBC <u>projected</u> universal eligibility would cost taxpayers \$33 million in the first year, but <u>that cost</u> is up to \$210 million (and counting) for the first quarter alone.
- Roughly 75% of new applicants have **never attended a public school**. Each of these applicants represents a new cost to the state General Fund, half of which funds public education.
- Supt. Horne has appointed Christine Accurso to oversee the ESA voucher program. Accurso **worked** with DeVos's American Federation for Children and the Goldwater Institute to oppose last summer's universal ESA voucher referendum.
- ◆Supt. Horne is already working to strip accountability relating to ESA vouchers from the ADE
