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President's Pen Becky's Musings

I truly thought – this group understands me - it wants equity and opportunity for women. I became a member that first day. Shortly after that I became the Public Policy Chair, then President-Elect, and then President of the Branch. The women I worked with were intelligent, committed, and INVOLVED. I had found a home in a somewhat (very) conservative locale with women who were thoughtful, caring, and open to learning about diverse issues.

Last Fall when approached to consider the Presidency of the State organization, I was aware that it would be a highly visible position filled with responsibility. So, I asked myself "why would I take this on?" I obviously believe in the organization's principles, its goals. But the State felt somewhat removed from local advocacy. I realized that if I took the position, I wanted to change that perspective. I want the State organization to be more of a resource for our local Branches, not just a layer between National and Branches.

I hope to encourage an environment in this state where all of our Branches feel as if they are a part of a thriving, productive organization focused on education and advocacy of women's issues – equity in employment and education, personal and professional development, and legislative empowerment. I would like us to all work together to make progress and the State can be the mechanism to bring us together.

Because I am new in my position, I feel it necessary to learn what the Branches and their members feel that they need and want from the State organization. In terms of what has kept me busy for this summer, I have been a member of the Planning Committee for our Fall Forum which will be held on November 4 at Scottsdale Community College. I am incredibly excited about the topic. We will be looking at the changing culture around education by considering the purpose of education from the perspective of some professional educators/administrators at the University level and from some graduate students who are training to become educators. We'll also consider what we might do to improve the situation in Arizona. Recently I read an article published by <u>The Membership Marketing Benchmarking Report</u> <u>2020</u> from Marketing General, Inc. They reported that the TOP 3 Ways Associations recruit New Members are:

- 1. Word-of-Mouth Recommendations --67% of their associations report that wordof-mouth recommendations get their organization the most new members.
- 2. Email --52% of associations report that *email* gets their organization the most new members.

To make the most of email recruitment, create <u>automated email campaigns</u> that include offers relevant to your prospects – upcoming invitation to meetings and events – these could go to any recent visitors or friends who might be interested in the event.

3. Association-Sponsored Events/Meetings --46% of associations report that association-sponsored events/meetings get their organization the most new members.

Have you surveyed your members lately to determine how they originally joined your branch? This can be very helpful and can be obtained by simply having a place on your application form for new members to state how they heard about your branch. If they state an existing member's name, you can follow up with that member with a "THANK YOU." Remember: Any member who recruits 3 members in any given year can earn a reward.
