Thanks go to the organizing group of Karen Ramos, Sharon Phelps, Jane Adrian, and Becky Gunn. # Moving Forward: The Why, the What, the How

On November 4, twenty (20) AAUW State and Branch Leaders met to discuss how we regain a Mission oriented momentum. Seven Branches were represented by their Presidents, VPs of Programs, Public Policy, and Membership. State Board members were also present.

Prior to the Visioning Session, the Board held their first in-person Board meeting since the beginning of COVID. It felt momentous and the energy was dynamic.

After a quick lunch, everyone gathered for an explanation of why the visioning session was necessary. President Becky Gunn noted that membership was down, it was difficult to fill leadership positions, and that we seem to be less issue/mission oriented than in the past. Breaking into small groups we discussed how AAUW had impacted, not only our lives, but women in general. We also spoke about what remained to be done. Karen Ramos, Director of Communications, provided concrete examples of AAUW accomplishments. The group then moved into an assessment of Mission based priorities that were relevant and impactful for Arizona. Using National's list of "AAUW Biennial Action Priorities" consisting of three General Priorities with detailed issues for each of the three, small groups discussed which of the priorities Arizona AAUW should pursue this year. After input from each of the small groups, everyone had the opportunity to vote on which of the priorities we should adopt.

Below is the list of priorities in not 'fully formed' verbiage. It was agreed that a more concrete formulation of the priorities along with talking points/action items will be generated by a Priorities Task Force. The Task Force will consist of Alice Buck, Karen Ramos, Sharon Phelps, Mary Humecke, and Becky Gunn. Priorities:

- 1. Universal access to quality, affordable health care including self-determination of one's reproductive health decisions.
- 2. Adequate and equitable funding and access to quality public education, and opposition to the use of public funds for non-public elementary/secondary education.
- 3. Programs that provide women with education, training, and support for success in the workforce including nontraditional occupations and women's entrepreneurship.

#### It was agreed that the focus of Legislative Day (SAVE THE DATE) on February. 21, 2024 would be Priority 1.

We accomplished a great deal during the session – just figuring out priorities for the Arizona AAUW is phenomenal, but we were not able to clearly define next steps. We agreed that the Task Force would clarify the priorities and would provide the Branches with supporting information about the priorities. That is just the beginning. We then need to create concrete action plans so that these priorities can be impactful.

The general tenor of the meeting was one of "let's do this" and everyone mentioned that they felt heard. It was a day of networking and a re-commitment to AAUW and its mission. We think we may do this type of event again . . . it was valuable on a personal level and on an organizational level.

Thanks go to the organizing group – Karen Ramos, Sharon Phelps, Jane Adrian, and Becky Gunn. We also thank our two Facilitators: Ester Groves and Marie Garbe. They truly facilitated a wonderful meeting.

### **Program Vice President**

The State Program Vice president shall serve as chair of the Program Development Committee composed of: Public Policy Chair, AAUW Funds Chair, Membership Vice President, and such others as may be deemed necessary. Assume the duties of the President in the President's absence or inability to serve in the year there is no President-Elect. Supervise arrangements for all state meetings which include coordinating with branches and arranging speakers.

## **Public Policy Chair**

The Public Policy Chair shall create a committee with members who are focused on the State Public Policy priorities. Plan a Public Policy event which traditionally has been a Legislative Day. Be a member of the Program Development Committee and assist in planning State events, specifically Fall and Spring Forums. Communicate with Branch Public Policy chairs providing current news centered on AAUW Issues.

#### **BRANCH MEMBERSHIP**

Our first AZ MEMBERSHIP MATTERS ZOOM took place by ZOOM on September 30. After learning from the Membership Marketing Benchmark Report of 2020 that the number one way to recruit new members for your branch is by word-of-mouth, we decided to take a look at some great ways to do that. This report stated that 67% of new members came to their organizations by word-of-mouth. Therefore, for this meeting we took a look at developing a great word-of-mouth "Elevator Pitch". This is a brief pitch or plug for joining your branch that you can give to someone when you step on an elevator and have only a couple of minutes to entice them to join. We examined the tip sheet from our national AAUW.org website which provided some ideas on "How to Make Your AAUW Elevator Pitch With Power." YOU can develop your own great pitch by first thinking about what 4 things about being a member of AAUW are important to you? Write them down. Then design your own personal elevator pitch using the following steps:

- 1. Start with an engaging opening sentence.
- 2. Follow with some relevant information about why you joined.
- 3. Give some examples of how you are involved (use some of the 4 things you enjoy about being a member),
- 4. End with a Call to Action. Invite them to your next Event or Program.

Having a somewhat organized plan can really help you inspire someone else to join your branch as well. Review your pitch from time to time and remember to keep it friendly and not canned.

When we again met on October 20, we looked at handouts "101 Ways to Get New Members For Your Organization" and "11 Effective Ways to Recruit New Members for Your Cause". We also shared some helpful tips on things our individual branches were doing to help prospective members. Jayann Fordon of Scottsdale branch shared how she has prepared a brochure to hand out whenever a prospective member approaches her. It lists the 2023-24 meeting calendar, how to become a member, and some background on AAUW. In addition, Northwest Valley Branch Judy Neigoff stated that she has asked members to bring a friend – another great word-of-mouth result.

Our next **AZ** MEMBERSHIP MATTERS ZOOM session is scheduled to take place on Friday, November 17, at 11:30 a.m. by ZOOM. At this meeting we will be looking at "Growing Membership: A Recruitment Tip Sheet" and "How to Successfully Initiate New Members".

A Zoom invitation will go out about 1 week before that meeting. If anyone wishes to secure copies of any of the documents mentioned, please email me and I will be happy to share them with you. ### **AAUW AZ and Branch Websites**

With the start of the 2023-2024 AAUW year, that usually means new members, new budgets, new program ideas, which also means website changes.

The AZ State and Branch websites are constructed on the same web platform called WordPress. Each website editor (aka website administrator) has her own login ID and password. WordPress can be a little confusing at first but with trial and error, time, and practice, WordPress can be user-friendly.

National does not mandate what the state or branches post on their sites. Some common pages are:

- ♣ Home page, also referred to as a launch page, with the most current information
- ♣ List of Board Members with contact information
- Calendar of Events
- Newsletters
- ♣ A Members Only section, password protected, for bylaws, policies, membership rosters, etc.

### A few website best practices:

- Keep the information up to date by bragging about branch achievements
- 4 'A picture is worth a thousand words' so upload a few and tell the story
- ♣ Maintain current contact information. Post board member contact information or a generic branch email so members and non-members can reach someone for information
- Link the branch website to the National and AZ State websites for additional content
