PUBLIC POLICY

It's hard to believe we're into the new year. This year will bring challenges, but we will remain focused on ensuring girls can access education without bias, creating economic equity for women, advancing leadership for women in the political sphere, and protecting women's health and reproductive rights.

Over the next few issues of <u>The Sun</u>, we will address each of these priorities individually. This issue, let's focus on education. But first, why do we need to be concern about public policy at the state level? Why is it important to be knowledgeable about state politics?

Virtually all our daily life experiences are affected by local government - from roads and local services to criminal justice, bodily autonomy, individual privacy, funding public institutions and schools, and so much more. Ninety-five--95% of the nation's legal action occurs in state courts. Arizona lawmakers introduced over 1,700 bills last year alone! The sheer volume of information can be overwhelming. You think "I don't do politics?" Think again: politics is simply the business of everyday life in our communities.

So back to education! As you know, public education is under attack from many directions - decreased state funding, school closures and ESA (Empowerment Scholarship Accounts). And Arizona students rank lower in mathematics and reading than the national average. Seems overwhelming, but being knowledgeable of other organizations and resources who are also working toward bettering public education is helpful.

Consider "Save Our Schools" (sosarizona.org). They have a weekly Ed Report available online. The Truth about ESA vouchers section explains the system and process and the impact on the state budget. Arizona School Board Association (azsba.org) is another source. Check their website for information about their mission, objectives and their advocacy.

Know your legislators and their stance on public education, ESA vouchers and support for pending legislation. Be aware that both the Education Committee in the Arizona House and in the Arizona Senate have new leadership.

Attend your local schools board meetings and get acquainted with your board members. Board meetings are very informative and provide an opportunity to voice our support of public education through **Request To Speak**.

We will update you as issues are brought up at both the state and local levels that relate to our Public Advocacy priority for education - equal access to quality public education, including access to diverse materials.

Calling all Quilters – Attend the East Mesa Quilt Presentation

The morning will start with our monthly business meeting at 10 a.m. followed by our featured speaker Penny Bose at 11 a.m.

Penny is an award-winning quilter from Chandler, Arizona. Her presentation will be *Quilting in America* and the impact quilts have had on our society. She has been recognized nationally as well as locally, and two of her quilts were published in the 2025 AQS (American Quilter's Society) event calendar. She made her first quilt in junior high and began quilting for clients ten years ago.

She opened her business "A Quilter's Creation" after creating several community service quilts. She designs patterns for herself and clients. She also enjoys spreading the comfort of quilts to people who might not otherwise enjoy them. Through Nimble Thimbles, her local chapter of the Arizona Quilt Guild, they give away more than 100 quilts every year to local philanthropies, including the American Legion and American Red Cross. These quilts let people know they are cared for on a very fundamental level.

Penny's quilts have hung in the Great Wisconsin Quilts Show, The International Quilt festival in

Penny loves the creative process, from designing her quilt patterns to creating digital designs for both her own and client quilts. She sees quilts as the voice of the maker, creating art that reflects moods, statements and, of course, love. She is bringing her quilt that features women and a few others that show the newest ideas in quilting. She loves researching the history of quilts and their stories.

We will be displaying photos of Hawaiian Quilts, Native American Quilts, and Slave Quilts and the stories of how they are part of our history in America. We would like to display quilts from our AAUW members and the community that have a story to share. We are hoping to display 20-25 quilts. National website to stay informed on what is happening at the National level.




Magdelena shared her leadership experience and keys to succeed as an outstanding leader. In addition, the work the YWCA
